**NOTICE OF SUMMER EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY:
WATER PATROL AND ATV PATROL
(NATURAL RESOURCES LAW ENFORCEMENT)**

The Iowa Department of Natural Resources, Law Enforcement Bureau is looking for qualified, interested, and motivated individuals to serve as **Temporary, Seasonal ATV and Water Patrol Officers**. There are potentially **45 Seasonal Patrol Officer** positions located throughout the state at Iowa’s popular lakes & river areas or ATV parks/use areas.

The deadline to apply for these positions is midnight February 15, 2015. You must have your complete application submitted as directed by that date. Interviews will be held in early March.

What does the Water Patrol or ATV Patrol do? Members of the Water Patrol and ATV Patrol team are temporary, summer employees of the IDNR. These are positions of high responsibility. They help work toward a safe recreational environment for the public by enforcing the state’s regulations; provide public assistance and safety education through personal contact and educational programs; respond to and assist in emergency situations; maintain equipment and storage facilities; and complete administrative duties as required (report writing, time and activity reporting, etc.).

- **Water Patrol duties include:** Patrolling of assigned areas on Iowa’s lakes and rivers by boat and foot—checking for compliance with Iowa’s navigation and fishing regulations.
- **ATV Patrol duties include:** Patrolling OHV parks and assigned areas by ATV and foot; secondarily, providing formal OHV operator education in accordance with the Department’s guidelines; and occasionally, serve as Water Patrol, as needed and available.

What are the dates of employment? Both Water and ATV Patrol begin working in mid-May and usually work until Labor Day. They may sometimes return for court appearances or to work some fall weekends. New Patrol members must attend several days of training and then start patrolling at their duty station on Memorial weekend.



What is the work schedule like? Both Water Patrol and ATV Patrol work a 40-hour work week, with two weekdays off per week. The exact schedule varies by location and is assigned by the Supervisor, but all work weekends (including all the holiday weekends of Memorial Day, July 4th, & Labor Day) and often evenings, late nights, and in all types of weather.

What does the job pay? \$12.00/hour (11/2014 figure)

What are some of the requirements?

- Must follow all application instructions fully.
- Must be available for all interviews (early March) and training (held on weekdays, typically beginning mid-May).
- A valid motor vehicle operator's license.
- Must be a United States citizen or legally able to work in the United States.
- Certification through Iowa's Boating Safety Education Program and the agency's ATV Safety Education program (ONLY by those hired; certification must be obtained before reporting for first workday and proof must be provided; certifications are NOT required in order to apply).
- Submission to and clearance of a thorough background check. (By applying you are consenting to this background investigation).
- Current CPR Certification issued through American Red Cross or the American Heart Association or similar. (If hired, certification must be obtained before reporting for first workday and proof must be provided).
- Minimum age: 18.
- Graduated from or currently enrolled/on break between semesters of college, or about to enter first semester of college from high school.
- Ability to work alone, with the public, in a law enforcement capacity, in all conditions, on weekends, and including holidays and nights.

Why should I apply to join the Seasonal Patrol? This job provides an excellent opportunity to learn more about the role of law enforcement in protecting Iowa's resources and recreationists. It is also an interesting, diverse, and often challenging and demanding position. The rewards are knowing you have made a difference in serving the resources and the public and learning more about your own role and capabilities in the natural resources law enforcement field. Serving with the Seasonal Patrol is an excellent way to gain experience, but it does not guarantee any future employment.
