Department Mission Statement – To conserve and enhance our natural resources in cooperation with individuals and organizations to improve the quality of life in Iowa and ensure a legacy for future generations.

Department Vision – Leading Iowans in caring for our natural resources.

Law Enforcement Bureau Mission Statement – It is the mission of the Law Enforcement Bureau to protect the State’s natural resources, to provide public safety, and to educate the public. We enhance, promote, and protect the natural resources of this state through public relations, education, and law enforcement, thus ensuring for future generations the rights, privileges, and benefits we now enjoy.

Department History – The Iowa Department of Natural Resources was created by the 71st General Assembly in 1986. Its creation was the result of the combining of four previous state agencies: Water, Air, and Waste Management; Iowa Energy Policy Council; Conservation Commission; and Iowa Geological Survey Organization.

Bureau Organization – The Law Enforcement Bureau provides services to citizens in all 99 counties. The central management staff work out of the Wallace State Office Building in Des Moines. There are five law enforcement districts in the state which are managed by District Supervisors. Conservation Officers and program staff work directly with all of the Bureaus in the division to provide resource protection, enhancement, and recreational opportunities for the citizens of Iowa.



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## WORDS FROM THE CHIEF

2010 was the scene of many changes for the Law Enforcement Bureau. I began my assignment as your new Law Enforcement Bureau Chief. I am honored to have been selected to fulfill this role. I have been impressed with the skills and abilities needed to be successful as a Conservation Law Enforcement Officer. They are truly dedicated to preserving Iowa's resources for the future generations. Officers answer citizen calls from their homes at all kinds of hours and respond to their duties without hesitation. They participate in recruitment and retention of young sportsmen through hunter education, outdoor shooting sports, fishing clinics, mentored hunts, motorized recreation, boating, and sports expos throughout the state of Iowa.

Jason Sandholdt was promoted to the rank of Assistant Bureau Chief and three new supervisors were selected to assist in leading the organization forward in the future. Shawn Meier was promoted to serve as the District 4 Supervisor. Randy Schnoebelen was promoted to serve as the District 5 Supervisor. Joli Vollers was promoted to Supervisor and will oversee the Licensing Section and the Bureau Training.

The big bonus for 2010 was the opportunity to hire 16 new conservation officers to fill the areas left open by the multiple retirements that the Bureau had experienced at the end of 2009. These new Conservation Officers were selected from over 540 people who applied for these positions. They completed the Conservation Officer Academy and four of them attended the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy. I was honored to serve as the keynote speaker to address their graduating class.

The successful hiring and training of our new officers is the responsibility of everyone in the organization. Recreational Safety Officers participated in conducting the knowledge screening test, Area Officers and District Supervisors staffed the first round of oral interviews, and all Supervisory staff conducted the second round of oral interviews and the final selection of the new officers. Conservation Officers conducted the background investigations and served as Field Training Officers for the rookie Conservation Officers. Officers, Area Officers, and Supervisors served as the Probationary Conservation Officer Academy staff and provided the necessary training of skills the new officers will need to succeed in their new profession.

This was a very exciting time to be in the organization. We honored Area Officer Craig Cutts as our Officer of the Year in 2009 and Area Officer Mike Bonser as our Officer of the Year in 2010, and one of our own Conservation Officers, Richard Price, was deployed with the military to Afghanistan for one year.

This report is a compilation of information for the Law Enforcement Bureau for the calendar years of 2009 and 2010. It reflects the important work that the Bureau's law enforcement personnel and program staff provide to the Department of Natural Resources and the citizens of Iowa.

In conclusion I want to tell you how proud and honored I am to be chosen to serve with such an elite and dedicated organization of Conservation Law Enforcement Officers.

# PROTECTING IOWA'S NATURAL RESOURCES



Conservation Officers use a variety of tools to protect Iowa's natural resources. The two busiest outdoor pursuits which Iowa has to offer are hunting and fishing. Officers have to devote a majority of their time to enforcing the regulation of these activities. Conservation Officers are certified Iowa Peace Officers and are charged with enforcing all statutes of the Code of Iowa.

Conservation Officers of the Bureau must also focus on other regulated outdoor activities, such as trapping, navigation, commercial fishing, snowmobiling, off-road recreation, permits and easements for construction on public lands and waters, dock rules enforcement, and ginseng harvesting.

Enforcement activities of federal regulations related to migratory waterfowl and the Lacey Act are additional duties of the Iowa Conservation Officer.

Because of Iowa's well-known trophy deer, the Law Enforcement Bureau has the difficult task of processing many requests for Iowa resident hunting privileges. The ultimate goal of these hunters is harvesting an Iowa trophy deer.

Conservation Officers encounter a variety of situations every day. Conservation Officers Ken Lonneman, Randy Schnoebelen, and Matt Washburn teamed up on a hunting complaint near Pilot Knob State Park in Winnebago County on the opening weekend of the 2009 squirrel season. Their

efforts resulted in citations to nine nonresident squirrel hunters from Minnesota who were charged with hunting in a game refuge.

Officer Luke Webinger spent many hours working a case dealing with the illegal method of take of paddlefish. With a high-market demand for caviar, Iowa's paddlefish have become vulnerable to over-harvest and poaching. Officer Webinger and neighboring officers provided surveillance on the snagging activity below the lock and dam on the Mississippi River. Officer Webinger made several cases in 2009 for violations of over-bag limits and size restrictions.

With limited information and good investigative skills, officers can be very successful in catching

violators. Case in point, Conservation Officers Joe Fourdyce, Tom Campbell, and Jacob Fulk worked a fish shocking case in Louisa County. The officers were able to charge three men with nineteen fishing violations with fines and civil damages in excess of \$2,600. The officers seized two electric shocking devices that the defendants were using to catch catfish.

On a simple tip, Conservation Officers Dan Pauley and Nate Haupert were able to work with limited information to build a case that branched out into five states with multiple defendants resulting in condemned equipment along with fines and civil damages that reached nearly \$100,000.

Commercialization of fish and wildlife is a major problem. After a successful investigation by Conservation Officer Andrew Keil and a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Officer, a search warrant was served

on a subject from Dubuque where they found 99 packages of catfish, 6 packages containing approximately 159 bluegills caught from the Mississippi River (109 over the legal limit), and a scale used to weigh the packages. Other items were seized from the residence, which included a fishing boat and a new freezer.

Officers Burt Walters and Jerry Farmer were a little surprised by the actions of an Indiana man who was charged with dip-netting more than 70 trout from a raceway at the Big Spring Hatchery near Elkader. The Indiana subject was charged with no fishing license, no trout fee, unlawful taking of trout from a state hatchery, and for possessing over the limit of trout. The subject pled guilty and paid fines of more than \$700 and was assessed more than \$1,000 in civil penalties. The subject was initially in Iowa to hunt during the spring turkey season.

The Law Enforcement Bureau takes fair chase seriously when it comes to fish and game. Four Edgewood area men were charged in February with illegally pursuing coyotes by using snowmobiles. These four subjects went beyond the fair chase

rule by using a snowmobile to chase and run over coyotes in Clayton and Delaware counties. The original complaint came from concerned outdoor enthusiasts regarding the legality, ethics, and fairness of this activity.

Enforcement also has to deal with the harvest and commercialization of Iowa's natural plants. Conservation Officers Burt Walters and Mike Macke spent nearly two years researching and reviewing other states' rules and ginseng reports in order to rewrite the State of Iowa's ginseng rules. Officers Walters and Macke were assisted by Conservation Officers Scott Kinseth, Dave Elledge, and their Law Enforcement Supervisor Jennifer Lancaster. With the new implemented rules, the state has a better definition for wild and cultivated ginseng, an improved permitting process to harvest and sell ginseng, and prohibits the harvest or planting of ginseng on state-owned and state-managed lands. The new rules also require better record-keeping and reporting requirements on the sale of ginseng.

Officers throughout the state make a wide variety of cases from waterfowl to fishing to the illegal sale of plants. In each case officers are dedicated to doing their best to protect Iowa's natural resources.



## ELECTRONIC LICENSING SYSTEM OF IOWA AND LICENSE TEAM

Realignment within the Department transferred the Licensing Team to the Law Enforcement Bureau from the Management Services Bureau and it was eventually brought under the direction of the Supervisor for Training and Licensing. This team of six dedicated employees is responsible for bringing in over \$30 million annually to the Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund. The team includes Executive Officers Casey Coppi, Rich Smith, and Mark Warren, and Administrative Assistants Justin Alliss, Laurie Rieck, and Marj Robbins.

In the summer of 2010, the License Team successfully implemented a new phase of the Electronic Licensing System of Iowa (ELSI), resulting in a more efficient and easier to use system for customers, officers, and staff. The Licensing Team is responsible for the development and maintenance of ELSI with the assistance of an outside vendor. ELSI is a fully-integrated network of point of sale, telephone, and Internet sales of selected outdoor recreation and commercial privileges administered by the Department. ELSI provides customers with a convenient way to purchase privileges and the Department with an effective method to enforce licensing regulations and collect and manage fees associated with these privileges.

ELSI sells 147 types of privileges and is able to record customer information such as harvest reports and landowner registrations in the database.

ELSI is modified annually or more frequently to adapt to changes in the Code of Iowa, the



Iowa Administrative Code, and DNR rules and procedures that affect the sale of privileges and tags. These changes may include hunting season dates, customer eligibility rules, and many others. ELSI is modified occasionally to add new functions such as selling snowmobile and ATV registrations and Iowa nonresident user permits.

ELSI interfaces with several other databases that provide information for customer identification or law enforcement functions, including the Iowa Department of Transportation driver's license database, multi-state violators compact, the Department of Human Services Child Support Recovery Unit's delinquent accounts collections, court-ordered sanctions and suspensions, and liquidated damages orders imposed by the court. ELSI also serves as a means for purchasers to make a voluntary donation to the Turn In Poachers (TIP) Program. In 2010, \$17,792 was collected for use by the TIP board, including rewards for anonymous informants.

One of the larger challenges the Law Enforcement Bureau deals with year round is the issue of residency. Iowa's whitetail deer population, specifically, is prized as the largest and best deer hunting experience in North America. Cases of nonresidents attempting to illegally acquire resident privileges are abundant. Continued advances to and expanding application of ELSI have developed it into another enforcement tool for Conservation Officers. Moving the License Team into the bureau has allowed for more cooperative initiatives between the technology and those who use the technology routinely in the execution of their job duties.

During 2010 an impressive upgrade in technology

for ELSI was unveiled. Commonly referred to as ELSI 2, the new system implemented a touch screen component for selecting options and entering data. From July 12, 2010, to July 16, 2010, Bureau staff and representatives of Active Outdoors, our vendor, conducted regional training sessions. Thirty training sessions were offered in fifteen locations throughout the state. Training consisted of installation and setup of equipment, as well as performing basic license sales and an overview and explanation of the many new features. In all, 697 representatives from 459 agents attended a training session. Surveys completed by the participants indicated that 90% of them thought the sales application design was either good or excellent, 84% rated the ease of the sales process as good or excellent, and 88% of the respondents scored their confidence level in the new system as good or excellent.



Conservation Officers in the Law Enforcement Bureau of the Department of Natural Resources are full-time Peace Officers. They are charged with enforcing all of the statutes of the State of Iowa and applicable Federal Code and regulations. Their jurisdiction expands from border to border and includes waterways and many areas that are accessible only by foot. Conservation Officers work in the most populous metropolitan areas of our state and also the most rural areas.

As State Peace Officers, Conservation Officers serve the citizens of Iowa in a variety of situations which range from protecting natural resources, enforcement of hunting and fishing laws, wildlife nuisance complaints, and providing education programs, to the enforcement of motor vehicle laws, personal assistance calls, and community enforcement efforts. Conservation Officers develop working relationships with their county officials, local police and sheriff personnel, as well as state and federal enforcement entities and their counterparts in other states.

Because of the breadth of situations where Conservation Officers are called to serve, it is an important directive of the of the Law Enforcement Bureau's Management Team that training provided to its officers be comprehensive, timely, and designed to prepare its officers for service and safety in the field.

### **NEW HIRES IN 2010**

In 2010 the Law Enforcement Bureau had multiple Conservation Officer position vacancies as result of budget constraints and the retirement of several veteran Conservation Officers in 2009. Being able to fill these positions was part of the Management Team's strategic goals. Having multiple counties without an officer assigned to them meant that public service was not at the desired level, officers were assigned to cover multiple counties, and that officer safety could be potentially compromised because of a reduced force.

Iowa's reputation for the professionalism of its DNR Law Enforcement Bureau, the bountiful opportunities for outdoor recreation, and its renowned designation as being a place to raise a family created a very large amount of interest when

the Bureau was able to post openings for Conservation Officer positions in 2010.

Screening of the applicants included background checks, mental health evaluations, physical agility testing, identification exercises related to conservation enforcement initiatives, reference checks, and a series of personal interviews.

The citizenry of Iowa was served well by the efforts of the Bureau Chief, Assistant Bureau Chief, District Supervisors, Training Coordinator, and Area Officers in the selection of the new officer hires made in 2010. Conservation Officers sworn in June 11, 2010, by Director Richard Leopold and Bureau Chief Robert Garrison are Nate Anderson assigned to Hamilton and Hardin Counties (NC District); Corey Carlton assigned

to Ringgold and Union Counties (SW District); Lucas Dever assigned to Winnebago and Worth Counties (NC District); Wes Gould assigned to Jefferson and Keokuk Counties (SE District); Dan Henderson assigned to Henry, Van Buren, and Washington Counties (SE District); Eric Hoffman assigned to Marion County (SW District); Nate Johnson assigned to Dubuque County (NE District); Chris Jones assigned to Black Hawk and Bremer Counties (NE District); Tyler Koch assigned to Humboldt and Webster Counties (NC District); Jared Landt assigned to Delaware and Jones Counties (NE District); Richard Price assigned to Pottawattamie County (SE District); Ben Schlader assigned to Louisa County (SE District); John Steinbach assigned to Grundy and Marshall Counties (NC District); Chris Subbert assigned to Chickasaw and Howard Counties (NC District); and Eric Wright assigned to Cedar and Jones Counties (SE District).

### **PROBATIONARY CONSERVATION OFFICER ACADEMY (PCOA)**

Training fourteen new officers with the same start date presented a welcomed but unique challenge to the Bureau. The solution used to address the situation was to develop a Probationary Conservation Officer Academy. Most of the training took place at the fish hatchery at Rathbun Lake. This facility provided housing, classroom space, and outdoor destinations conducive to training all in one place. This minimized both travel and expenses and allowed the new officers the ability to learn to work together and with their training officers in an intensive and in-depth environment. Other training sites included Camp Dodge, the Wallace State Office Building, and the

Iowa Great Lakes area.

The PCOA was eight weeks in duration and involved 55 Department personnel in training the new officers. Training was received from Forestry, Parks, Budget and Finance, and Customer and Employee Services Bureaus. In addition to the investigative and law enforcement training received, new officers were also exposed to the ATV Program, Snowmobile Program, Boating Program, Shooting Sports Program, and the Hunting Safety and Education Programs.

The new Conservation Officers received specific training in the areas of professional communications, report writing, firearms familiarization, water and ice safety, swift water rescue, boating while intoxicated testing, interview and interrogation techniques, driving training, ATV operations training, incident investigation, aquatic education, and permit issuance in addition to the basic training received in legal issues, Conservation and Recreation Division policies and procedures, enforcement of navigation and motorized vehicle laws, and hunting, fishing, fur harvesting, and trapping regulations.

### **IOWA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY**

As noted, Conservation Officers are State Peace Officers with all of the responsibilities and training that are fundamental in the position. Because of the wealth of experience and professional peace officer positions held by the new hires (Deputy County Sheriff, Park Ranger, other state conservation officer, County Conservation Board Director, and municipal police officer) only four of the new officers were assigned to attend the

ILEA at Camp Dodge to complete peace officer certification in accordance with Iowa Code. For over three months the officers attended classes and trained hands on in all facets of police work, culminating in graduation with the 237th Basic in December.

### **FIELD TRAINING OFFICER PROGRAM**

Upon finishing their training at the PCOA and ILEA, the probationary Conservation Officers embarked upon a nine-week period of field training. The new officers were paired one-on-one with an experienced Conservation Officer who directed their continued learning by helping them transfer the information they had learned in their prior training environments into practical application in the field. Each new Conservation Officer was assigned to a Primary Field Training Officer, but they were also able to learn from other officers during this time period. New Conservation Officers were paired up with Field Training Officers throughout their district to expose them to different field experiences, some which may be prevalent in their assigned territory and some which they need to know but may encounter less frequently after their field training period.

A Primary Field Training Officer (PFTO) works with the assigned PCO for two weeks at the beginning and end of field training and for one week in the middle of the training. Field Training Officers (FTO) work with a PCO for 2 weeks in between his assignments with his PFTO.

### **MANDATORY TRAINING FOR CONSERVATION OFFICERS**

In order to maintain a status of Peace Officer, there is mandatory training each Conservation Officer must complete. Some training is received on an annual basis, and other training components have a longer time interval between sessions. In general, most of the training received by IDNR Conservation Officers is provided by their fellow officers who receive additional training and certification from the ILEA. These dedicated officers volunteer to become certified and lead their fellow officers. They instruct multiple times annually and must attend recertification schools every 3 years for each discipline in which they are certified.

Training which must be received on an annual basis includes firearms qualification, general law enforcement training, blood borne pathogens, hazardous materials, use of force, defensive tactics, and CPR. Training which must be received every five years includes dependent adult abuse and child

abuse training.

### **JEFF BAILE TRAINING**

On August 9 – 11, 2010, Conservation Officers were afforded the opportunity to attend a training held by Jeff Baile, Certified Forensic Interviewer, titled “Forensic Interview and Interrogation Techniques for Conservation Officers”. Mr. Baile had a distinguished 25-year Conservation Officer career in Peoria, Illinois. He has accumulated hundreds of hours of formalized training in professional interviewing and interrogation techniques and body language analysis. He extracted an estimated 5,000 confessions from poachers to burglars to vandals to drug users to hostile witnesses. His cases were rarely contested in court due to his high confession rate.

During the training held in August, participants were given detailed instruction in obtaining admissions and confessions in the Conservation Officer’s natural settings, e.g., in a barn, a farmer’s kitchen table, river bank, duck blind, goose pit, tailgate, tree stand, boat, sitting on a log. etc. Traditional interview room settings were also discussed. Participants were offered opportunities to engage in mock classroom interrogations centered on relevant enforcement situations.



After many years of working toward a system that would allow Conservation Officers to complete electronic times sheets, a system was found that would allow a paperless time sheet. The Iowa Department of Transportation (DOT) has a computer program that allowed peace officers of the State of Iowa to not only track their time but could also complete accident reports, issue citations and warnings, and it allowed for other forms to be created and used specific to the Law Enforcement Bureau's needs. The program is called TraCS (Traffic and Criminal Software).

Work on the forms and testing of the programming was completed in 2009, and early 2010 was spent getting the system ready for distribution and training the Conservation Officers on the new system. Southeast Iowa District Supervisor Shawn Meier served as liaison between the DNR and DOT and oversaw training for the Department's staff.


In June 2010, starting in the SE district and working around the state, Conservation Officers installed the TraCS program on their laptop computers and began utilizing all of the forms available to them. Some of these forms were the Time and Activity Reporting System, ECCO or Electronic Citation form, the warning form, boat and motor vehicle accident forms, hunting incident forms, and others. The goals for implementing this electronic system included having digital information that could be available upon demand; having forms which were streamlined for ease, simplicity, and speed for data

entry; and better documentation.

One of the major issues discovered during deployment was the existing type of portable computers which the Department's Conservation Officers had to use with the new program. Many agencies using TraCS use a rugged computer that was designed to absorb impact, was water resistant to protect the internal workings, had a special screen to make it easier to use in direct sunlight, and could be mounted in enforcement vehicles. The Department decided that it would issue rugged mobile computers to the 14 new Conservation Officers hired in 2010 so that they would be able to fully implement TraCS. The new computers not only offered the rugged support needed for computer programs, like crashing through the chiseled grain fields of Iowa, but it also had the ability to use touch screen applications. The touch screen made it easier for issuing a citation and made the citation uniform in appearance to a traffic citation which allowed for ease of understanding for the violator.

Along with touch screen applications, Conservation Officers also have access to bar code scanners that read information from the back of a driver's license to populate information in different forms. It is a goal of the Law Enforcement Bureau to be able to use a license issued by the Department in a similar manner in the future.

In the interest of increasing efficiency for its Conservation Officers, other programs were identified which could be successfully used by the



Bureau. One such program that is currently being tested is MACH. The MACH system allows for a real-time view of location and direction of all law enforcement officers and entities that use the system across the State of Iowa. MACH allows for a state radio dispatcher to provide directions to incident location and for call of the closest back up in an enforcement incident situation. One of the best features of MACH for Conservation Officers is the ability to run vehicle plates and record checks on individuals



# COOPERATIVE EFFORTS WITH OTHER BUREAUS

The Law Enforcement Bureau works jointly with the other Bureaus in the Conservation and Recreation Division to provide support and assistance.

All Bureaus of the Conservation and Recreation Division share the same vision, which is leading Iowans in caring for our natural resources. All Bureaus share similar missions and the Law Enforcement Bureau has a mission to protect the state's natural resources, provide public safety, and to educate the public.

For example, law enforcement is in charge of enforcing the rules and regulations set forth by the management plans developed by the fish and wildlife Bureaus. The fish and wildlife Bureaus manage habitats that produce strong fish and wildlife populations in the state to ensure a legacy for future generations.

There is great collaboration between the Bureaus of the Fish and Game Trust Fund. The three Bureaus, fisheries, wildlife, and law enforcement, will usually host joint meetings in districts across the state to share ideas and programs that each Bureau is working on. Particularly in Northeast Iowa employees of all three Bureaus have a chance to update each other on current activities, both on a personal and a professional level. These are informal meetings where information is relayed in a relaxed atmosphere. The main idea of the day: We're all in this together.

Conservation Officers in Northwest Iowa in the Storm Lake and Great Lakes areas assisted fisheries in walleye gill netting operations, which resulted in a record number of walleyes netted for egg production in 2009.

The Bureaus of the Conservation and Recreation Division share similar core mission values:

- Protection of the Resources
- Public Safety
- Education

Conservation Officer Tom Campbell and fisheries technician Dennis Weise, in cooperation with the Muscatine County Conservation Board, organized a fur harvester program. Eleven students were certified that ranged in age from 11 to 62.



# EFFORTS WITH OTHER JURISDICTIONS AND AGENCIES



Iowa Conservation Officers have developed a good working relationship with many different agencies. Conservation Officers work closely with local, state, and federal personnel, including conservation officers from other states.

Conservation Officer Jeff Harrison, assigned to Scott County and the Mississippi River, participated with the National Operation Dry Water Project. The project brought together the U.S. Coast Guard, Iowa State Patrol, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, and the Iowa DNR. The combined enforcement program raised awareness of boat safety for that area, bringing with it numerous media press releases, to reinforce the need for water safety and the dangers of mixing alcohol and boating.

Conservation Officer Erika Billerbeck along with Jeff Beck of the Army Corps of Engineers served on a focus group dealing with ATV injury prevention. The group made up of pediatric trauma workers from the University of Iowa Children's Hospital and the Safe Kids Coalition of Johnson County worked together to obtain a grant from Kohl's Department Store that was used to develop and present an ATV

education curriculum to area school-age students. The long-range goal of the program is to have a statewide implementation of the school-based curriculum.

Due to record snowfall amounts in 2009, snowmobilers were out in full force. In an attempt to limit incidents involving snowmobilers who were operating under the influence of alcohol, Conservation Officers in northeast and north-central Iowa teamed up with the Iowa State Patrol, deputy sheriffs, and local police departments for two special projects. During those operations 227 snowmobile operators were contacted and 10 OWI arrests were made. In addition, 31 other violations were cited including no snowmobile safety certificate, failure to display current registration, along with several moving violations including operating a motor vehicle with a revoked license. The State Patrol's aircraft was used to assist with locating the snowmobilers along the many snowmobile trails that connect the towns.

Conservation Officer Dave Elledge headed up an investigation involving two Saluda, South Carolina men. The first subject was charged with and pled guilty to four counts of making false claims to obtain resident Iowa deer licenses and one count of making false claims to obtain an Iowa resident turkey license. The second subject was charged with and pled guilty to possessing game without a valid license. Both subjects were sentenced to pay maximum fines and court costs, as well as liquidated damages for the violations. The fines, court costs, and civil damages assessed amounted to over \$15,000. Both were ordered to return two sets of buck deer antlers to the Iowa DNR. In addition, the Court ordered five-year suspensions of Iowa hunting and fishing privileges for both subjects. This investigation brought together many Conservation Officers, personnel from the License Section, and the Special Investigation Unit of the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources Enforcement Bureau.

The most engaging aspects and duties of a Conservation Officer are the always changing activities an officer encounters with the job. As was the case on July 8, 2009. Conservation Officers Jeff Swearngin and Craig Cutts had planned to spend the morning investigating fish snagging activities at the Saylorville Lake spillway. Instead, they were called upon by their Bureau Chief to respond to a request to assist with a federal search warrant that was being served. When they arrived at the scene they were greeted by agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF), State Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI), and officers from the Iowa State Patrol (ISP). Officers Cutts and Swearngin found themselves assisting with the investigation of a multi-state dog fighting ring.

Conservation Officer Matt Bruner was also called in to assist with the investigation. DNR officers filed numerous fish and game violations against two juveniles who were at the scene. The investigation resulted in the seizure of five buck deer heads, one live fawn, numerous state game area and public hunting signs, sawed-off deer antlers, and drugs and drug paraphernalia, along with several dogs. Due to the investigative work by the assisting Conservation Officers, the federal agents were provided additional information which led them to an adjacent farm that housed a large marijuana-growing operation.

In early December during the first shotgun season, officers in northeast Iowa worked with the Iowa State Patrol airplane. During that time period of the first shotgun deer season, over 600 hunter contacts were made. Citations and violations were issued for loaded and assembled guns in a vehicle, illegal transportation of deer, no valid deer tag, no hunter-orange apparel, and numerous traffic violations. Warning memorandums were also issued. There was a good cooperative ground effort between the officers, the Iowa State Patrol, and county law enforcement officers to bring together a successful presence out in the field during one of the busiest hunting times of the year.



While on routine patrol, Conservation Officer Jerry Farmer received a radio call from state police dispatch regarding an “attempt to locate” for a particular subject. Officer Farmer, with the assistance of Clayton County Park Ranger Tucker Anderson, was able to locate and stop the subject after a pursuit. The vehicle stop and investigation resulted in a search warrant with multiple charges being filed in both Clayton and Fayette counties, that were related to felony eluding, OWI fourth offense, manufacturing and possession of a controlled substance, two counts each of kidnapping and sexual assault, and numerous ginseng violations.

# COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT



Conservation Officers take an active part in their local community activities and often are recognized as the face of the Department. Wherever officers find themselves in the community, the general public will find them to ask about the best fishing holes, places to hunt, or just overall tips and techniques to improve their chance of success. Citizens enjoy having officers as part of their communities because they are well-recognized and trusted.

Conservation Officers have an active role in assisting with natural disasters, search and recovery efforts, general community policing efforts, and education activities designed to promote safety of the great outdoors.

With all of the flooding issues the state has experienced in recent years, a good, sound flood response plan has become critical for the protection of citizens and property. When rivers flood, officers are called in to assist communities to provide them much-needed assistance during this natural disaster. United States Representative Dave

Loeb'sack took a tour of the Cedar River in Cedar Rapids. Representative Loeb'sack toured the area, along with the Army Corps of Engineers, to see what improvements could be made to help reduce flooding in the Cedar Rapids area. Conservation Officers assisting with the tour were Mike Bonser, Scott Kineth, Aric Sloterdyk and Pat Jorgensen.

In December 2009 while working enforcement with the Iowa State Patrol airplane, a report was transmitted of a lost hunter in the Volga River Recreation Area. Few access roads lead into the 5,600- acre area, comprised mostly of timber with 80-foot bluffs, made searching for the lost hunter very difficult.

With the assistance of Trooper Pilot Brian Bartels and Conservation Officer Scott Kineth who was also in the plane, the hunter was located. They were able to direct search and rescue personnel from the Sheriff's Office and the Park Ranger to the lost hunter. Without this assistance, the hunter would have had to spend the night in the timber where the low temperature for that night was 15 degrees.

When civil unrest broke out in Dubuque over Labor Day Weekend 2009, 10 Conservation Officers from northeast and north-central Iowa were called in to assist the local law enforcement agencies. The civil unrest was due to a multiple-stabbing incident resulting in a fatality. Officers were part of a response team charged with controlling spontaneous violence which erupted in the Dubuque neighborhoods and the business district in response to the stabbings.

Numerous arrests were made due to the rioting. The officers who assisted the Dubuque Police Department were Andrew Keil, Pat Jorgensen, Aric Sloterdyk, Burt Walters, Scott Kineth, Matt Washburn, Eric Johnston, Jerry Farmer, Ron Lane, and Mike Bonser.

Conservation Officers in all districts are active in youth mentored hunts, fishing clinics, and education programs.



Conservation Officer Kirby Bragg assigned to Jasper County was one of the first officers to organize a disabled mentored hunt for pheasant and ducks. Conservation Officer Jeff Swearngin, who assists with these events, offers the following recap of the experience:

*Iowa Conservation Officers do more than just enforce fish and game laws. Officers teach hunter safety, pick-up injured animals, talk with youth groups, work outdoor accidents, work with boats, ATVs, and many other tasks. One task that many officers enjoy is youth and special hunts. One such hunt takes place each fall in Polk County. The hunt is a duck hunt for sportsmen and women that have become injured or are disabled. The hunt is sponsored by a Jasper County sportsman's group.*

*The hunt was held on October 21, 2009. The sportsman's group came out the day before to build special blinds that would accommodate wheel chairs, or any other special needs. On the day of the hunt, everyone showed up very early in the morning to fix breakfast and meet the hunters. Some of these men and women once hunted, but their disabilities now limited their access. They were all excited to get back out on the hunt! The volunteers brought their utility vehicles with trailers to get everyone and their chairs out into the marsh. Each blind had a duck hunter with a dog and decoys to assist their hunter.*

*The day was slow, with a poor duck flight. Some shots were taken with very few hits. It did not matter to the men and women in the marsh. They were whole again, enjoying a duck hunt. When the hunt was over, everyone got together to share their new hunting stories, and to rib each other about the misses.*

*When the hunters were thanking everyone for the hunt, some of the men had tears in their eyes, thankful to be out there again. For some it had been 20 years. I know that for all of the volunteers involved, the next hunt cannot come soon enough.*

# Lake Delhi Dam Breach



Record heavy rainfall over a short amount of time caused the Maquoketa River to rise quickly and breach the Lake Delhi Dam on the Maquoketa River in Delaware County on July 24, 2010. As many as 700 homes and cabins above the dam were evacuated because of the high water. Homes below the dam were also evacuated for many miles downstream. The rising floodwaters caused major flooding upstream in Manchester also. The rushing water ate a 30-foot-wide hole in the earthen dam, causing water to drop 45 feet to the river below. The DNR's patrol boat also went through the dam; lift and all, along with many other boats, docks and a few other structures. The surge of floodwater spread out over thousands of acres of farmland downstream and lost most of its punch before arriving about three hours later in Hopkinton. The Lake Delhi dam was 81 years old. The dam was completed in 1929 by the Interstate Power Co.. The dam generated power until 1973. In 1974, Interstate Power sold the dam to the Lake Delhi Recreation Association, a group of residents seeking to preserve recreational opportunities at the lake. The association still owns the dam. Conservation Officers and Water Patrol Officers spent several days in and around the former lake and at the dam area.

# RECREATIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS



The recreational education programs conducted by the Law Enforcement Bureau cover a variety of outdoor recreational opportunities. Many of these programs are mandated by law. The main goal of these programs is to promote a consistent and quality educational experience for all of the participants. With Administrative Rules in place, we maintain a strong volunteer base of educated and trained instructors to help teach our programs.

## Hunter Education

Six full-time Recreation Safety Officers are assigned to the Hunter Education Program. These officers are responsible for the oversight of classes taught in each district along with an accurate record-keeping requirement on the certification of volunteer instructors. Recreation Safety Officers have the primary responsibility of investigating major hunting incidents in their district.

In 2009 the Law Enforcement Bureau certified 9,000 students in Hunter Education and in 2010 certified approximately 10,000 students.

## Boating Education

There are three certification options for Boating Education in Iowa which include instructor-led classes, an online course, and a home-study program. A total of 3,298 students were certified in 2009 and 2010. From these certifications, 835 students completed the home-study program, 2,102 students completed the online course, and in partnership with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the U.S. Power Squadron, the Bureau was able to teach 61 instructor-led classes certifying 361 students.

## Shooting Sports

The goals of the Shooting Sports Program are to introduce Iowans to the sport of target shooting, provide opportunities, and improve existing facilities. Through these programs the DNR is working to ensure the future of hunting, shooting, and outdoor conservation for generations. Target shooting is one of the safest recreational activities and can become a lifelong sport that families can enjoy together. Target shooting teaches the fundamental marksmanship skills required for hunting and provides multiple avenues for families to get involved in hunting and other outdoor pursuits.

The Department's Shooting Sports Program Coordinator and six seasonal Range Safety Officers, helped operate the Shooting Sports Program and facilities.

## National Archery in the Schools Program

The National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) is a joint venture between the state Department of Education and the Iowa DNR's Law Enforcement and Wildlife Bureaus in partnership with several archery equipment manufacturers and archery organizations. The program is designed to promote student education and participation in the lifelong sport of archery. The program's focus is to provide international style target archery training in physical education classes for grades 4 through 12. For the schools that participate in NASP, the Iowa DNR provides the administration and instructor training, coordinates the statewide NASP archery league, and the state championship event.



## Scholastic Clay Target Program

The Iowa High School and Scholastic Clay Target Program (SCTP) is a team-based clay target shooting program for school-age participants. Through organized clay target shooting, youth are learning

firearm safety and teamwork along with skills in respect for self and others, mental focus, and self-discipline. On the national level there has been more than 10,000 SCTP participants. In Iowa, the SCTP has joined forces with Iowa's high school trapshooting programs to establish a spring shooting season for organized trap, skeet, and sporting clays.

### Snowmobile Education

An abundant year of snow fall with an extended snow cover increased interest in completing the snowmobile education course. Snowmobile operators in Iowa have two options for receiving their certification. Instructor-led classes are sponsored and taught by members of local snowmobile clubs, by county conservation boards, and by Conservation Officers. The second option is a home-study program where students are provided the required course material and submit the comprehensive exam to the Bureau. In 2009 the Law Enforcement Bureau certified 589 students and in 2010 certified 452 students.

### Groomer Operator Certification

In addition to a basic snowmobile education course, the Bureau also provides a certification in the use of snowmobile grooming equipment for operators. This specialized training provided in partnership with the Iowa State Snowmobile Association consists of two components: a classroom curriculum and a supervised practical training. With this certification, an increased number of certified operators were available to groom more than 5,000 miles of snowmobile trails in Iowa.

### All-terrain Vehicle Education

With its first student class taught in 2009, the ATV Education Program has been very successful. ATV instructors received training and teaching aides needed to successfully teach range-based classes. The ATV education course is rider-based and taught entirely in an outdoor environment. The course focuses on the student's skill development by having them demonstrate safe riding techniques while under the direct supervision of a DNR-certified instructor. The Bureau currently has eight DNR-recognized off-highway vehicle parks where the majority of ATV students receive their training. In 2009 the Law Enforcement Bureau sponsored 15 classes and certified 98 students and in 2010 held 10 classes and certified 54 students.

To attend a class, one of the requirements is for the student to provide their own properly sized and registered machines. Besides learning safe operations, the students also understand proper machine upkeep and maintenance, environmental concerns related to ATVs, and the principles of Tread Lightly!



## **Online Courses**

2010 saw a shift in the way that recreational education programs are offered to residents of Iowa. For a variety of reasons, all of the major recreational education certification programs offered by the Law Enforcement Bureau moved to an online format. Several important factors contributed to this change. It is the goal of the department to make recreational education courses available, accessible, and, when possible, convenient to its residents. However, some course offerings have historically been limited by seasons and geographic location. Others are impacted by the quantity of material covered during the classroom portion of the class. In assessing the needs of the programs and factoring in the national trends in course offerings, it made sense to explore what offerings existed in an interactive, electronic format.

Online courses approved for use by the LE Bureau are described as “managed” courses. This means that the student must go through the material in a sequential nature (start with chapter 1 and complete the chapters in order). Quizzes are administered at the end of each chapter that must be passed to progress in the course. There is a proficiency standard

for passing the final exam. The course is self-paced and designed to let students log in and out as they like so that the course does not have to be completed in one sitting, and each page is narrated. A student can choose to not use the narration but is still required to spend the same amount of time on the page as it takes for it to be narrated. Students may not skip around in the course or advance through pages to get to the quizzes and course exam.

On a monthly and an annual reporting schedule, the vendor produces reports detailing student data. Having this data allows us to market our products to where they are being most used and to refine the curriculum in areas that either need more coverage or may be confusing to the user.

## **Administrative Rules**

Initial review of the Administrative Rules which govern the recreational education programs identified a need to align the certification process for the various programs and to find a way to communicate this effectively to the public.

The new rules specify certification requirements for instructors, requirements for an instructor to have an “active” instructor status, and requirements and responsibilities of a DNR-certified instructor. The rules also cover program specifics for each of the DNR recreational education programs and offerings. As part of the new rules, all instructors in every education program sponsored by the DNR must attend an instructor development workshop once every two years and teach a course at least once every two years. To facilitate this training, program staff are researching the use of web-based technology to decrease the amount of travel time and expense for our volunteer instructors and program staff.

These new rules provide clarity, consistency, and transparency to Department staff, volunteer instructors, and the public.

**OTRATS**

The DNR's Online Training Registration and Tracking System is a web-based database system that is designed to track student and instructor data, allow students to register for classes, allow instructors to post their course offerings, track instructor volunteer hours and statistics, allow Program Coordinators to post downloadable information for students, and eventually collect student course fees. The basic goals for OTRATS are to streamline paperwork for instructors, make finding a class easier for students, and enable the Department to have more accurate and searchable program data.

During the first year of implementation nearly 10,000 students registered for a class through the online system and over 400 instructors created an account and managed their classes online.

Future improvements to the system will focus on improving the reporting capacities and making the system more user friendly. Eventually it is hoped this system will communicate with ELSI.

**DAVE OAKES**

One of the findings of the peer review of the Hunter Education Program which was conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the International Hunter Education Association was that the program needed to provide instructors and staff with advanced training to improve their public speaking and delivery skills. During the summer of 2010, six training sessions were held throughout the state to assist volunteer hunter education instructors and program staff with these identified skills.

Dave Oakes was contracted to travel to Iowa to deliver his program "The Guide to Powerful Public Speaking." Topics covered included: ways to overcome the fear of public speaking, things to avoid in a presentation, types of presentations, Nine Simple Steps to Solve the Presentation Puzzle, how to use visual aids, effective rehearsal strategies, controlling the environment, and the psychology of a great delivery.

**PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS**

In 2010 the Bureau began to actively pursue public service announcements on television and the internet. The Bureau partnered with ABC5 in Des Moines to begin filming various PSAs on the subjects of hunting rules and safety, boating etiquette and safety, ice safety, safe operation of and rules related to all-terrain vehicles, and safe and smart snowmobiling. These PSAs were aired in over 30 counties in the central Iowa area. In 2011, the Bureau plans to expand the PSA coverage statewide and also to partner with other television stations on this very important effort to get safety information out to the public.

# OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES



The Law Enforcement Bureau is committed to providing outdoor recreational opportunities to provide a legacy for future generations. The Bureau is involved in three programs which target youth and adults.

## Outdoor Journey for Girls

The Outdoor Journey for Girls (OJ) Program was conceived to offer girls the opportunity to experience a variety of outdoor activities.



Three of these camps are held each year during the months of June, July, and August. The camps can serve 180 participants a summer and the outdoor skills taught during these camps include: canoeing and water safety, orienting, fishing, archery, shooting rifles/shotguns, conservation, camping, game care, trapping, fur harvesting, fish identification, and fish cooking/cleaning. The camps were held at two locations: Springbrook Education Center located near Guthrie Center, Iowa, and at Hickory Hills County Park in Black Hawk County just south of Waterloo, Iowa.



## Youth Hunter Education Challenge

The Iowa Youth Hunter Education Challenge (YHEC) is a weekend-long annual event in June held at the Iowa 4-H Education and Natural Resources Center near Madrid, Iowa. Participants from across Iowa come together to compete and learn in a series of events.



Participants are registered as teams for the weekend event. The teams learn about the outdoors and interact with other youth and adults that have similar interests. The weekend includes shooting events involving archery, muzzleloading rifle, shotgun, and small-bore rifle along with wildlife identification, orienting, and hunting scenarios that are followed up with a written exam. Teams are individually scored based on their performance of completing each activity and the results of their final written exam.

The teams are coached by certified DNR Hunter Education instructors. Prior to the event, instructors work with their team at the local level to prepare for the challenges the team will encounter at the weekend event. For the participants, the event is like a day in the field with a hunting companion.

## Conservation Leaders for Tomorrow

Conservation Leaders for Tomorrow (CLfT) is a professional development program designed for agency leaders and university level students who either work in natural resource fields or intend to. CLfT provides opportunities for conservation and hunting education, awareness, and experiences for those individuals who have not previously participated. CLfT consists of 4 and 5 day workshops with leading natural resource professionals and conservationists, blending highly interactive classroom discussion with field experiences that encourage critical review of information and exchange of perspectives. The program provides participants a lasting experience in outdoor activities to be used in work-related programs that affect the regulation of outdoor activities and recreational education programs.

the performance of their job duties. Today, almost half of all students graduating with a degree in fish and wildlife sciences have never hunted; many have never fished. These graduates enter the workforce without practical experiences and perspectives necessary to successfully continue and lead conservation efforts. Concerned professionals within the Wildlife Management Institute of Washington, DC, and leaders of hunter education projects at the Wisconsin, Penn State, and Colorado State Universities sought to curb this trend by collaborating with the Max McGraw Wildlife Foundation of Dundee, Illinois and other supporting nonprofits by developing CLfT. In 2010, CLfT was expanded to include conservation agency leaders in a specially geared week-long program for those already in positions of conservation decision making.

In November 2009, four Iowa State undergrads were selected through a competitive process to attend the student workshop at the McGraw Wildlife Foundation in Illinois. In January 2010, Iowa was represented in the first-ever agency program by the participation of Deputy Director Pat Boddy. Largely due to the response and support of participants of this workshop including DD Boddy, CLfT expanded its agency program to multiple sessions annually held across the country. In February and again in December 2010, Vollers was requested to present at the annual instructor certification and the second agency programs in Georgia. In October 2010 Iowa State expanded its student participation to include graduate students.

Forty years ago nearly every university student majoring in fish and wildlife sciences was a hunter or angler. Federal and State agencies were able to fill positions with individuals who could draw on those experiences in

## Iowa's CLfT Program

The Iowa DNR's formal involvement with CLfT began in July 2009. # BUREAU PROGRAMS



## Boating Program

In 2009 Iowa had 40 boating incidents where 3 of the incidents resulted in a fatality, 21 resulted in personal injury, and 16 resulted in property damage. Fourteen out of the forty boating incidents involved a personal watercraft (PWC). Most of the reportable incidents occurred on Iowa's busiest lakes and rivers. One of the major contributing factors was careless operation and the most common type of injury was broken bones. Eighteen percent of the total reportable boating incidents for 2009 had alcohol involved.

In 2010 Iowa had 54 boating incidents where 5 of the incidents resulted in a fatality, 35 resulted in personal injury, and 14 resulted in property damage. Twelve out of the fifty-four incidents involved a PWC. Most of the reportable incidents occurred on federal reservoirs, bordering rivers, and on Spirit Lake. The leading cause of boating incidents in 2010 was a result of carelessness and the most common type of injury was head trauma. Again this year, 18% of the incidents involved alcohol. Seventy-three percent of operators involved in a reportable incident were not certified in boater education.

## Boating Safety

Thirty-five hundred hours of boating safety time were recorded by Conservation Officers along with 79 boating safety educational programs presented at schools and other civic organizations in 2009. There were 194 boating safety programs presented in 2010. Conservation Officers spent approximately 35,000 hours on the water enforcing navigation rules and regulations annually. Special projects were scheduled across the state that focused on safety equipment and safe operation on Iowa's waterways. Twenty-four boating while intoxicated (BWI) arrests were made throughout the 2009 boating season and 35 BWI arrests were made in 2010.

## Shooting Range Program

There are 12 DNR shooting ranges across the state. The Banner Shooting Range in Warren County and the Charles "Butch" Olofson Shooting Range in Polk County are fully staffed. The Hawkeye Wildlife Shooting Range in Johnson County and the Princeton Shooting Range in Scott County are partially staffed.



The remaining eight ranges are not staffed: Bays Branch in Guthrie County, Brush Creek in Webster County, Hull in Mahaska County, Ochededan in Clay County, Oyens in Plymouth County, Pine Ridge in Hardin County, and Spring Run in Dickinson County

## Training Program

The Bureau maintains a strong training program for its field officers, probationary officers, and seasonal officers. The success of the training programs are a direct result of the many hours of dedicated service by the Conservation Officers who step up to volunteer as instructor/trainers (I/Ts). The Conservation Officers who willingly serve as I/Ts for the Bureau do so in addition to their regular duties. Many of these officers in order to maintain their training certification must recertify every three years at the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy.

# BUREAU PROGRAMS

## Seasonal Patrol Officer Program

The Seasonal Patrol Officer (SPO) Program provides college students who are interested in conservation law enforcement a unique opportunity to gain experience in this line of work. The SPOs provide additional fish, navigation, and ATV enforcement during the summer months. Annually the SPOs provide over 30,000 hours of enforcement, education, and emergency response. Conservation Officers with assigned SPOs in their areas have added enforcement to their navigational waterways and ATV parks.

## Off-highway Vehicle Program

The OHV Program of the DNR is responsible for the registration of machines, distribution of these funds, and for writing the rules and regulations which govern the use of these vehicles under the guidance of the Iowa Legislature. Regulated machines include all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), off-road motorcycles (ORMs), and off-road utility vehicles (ORVs).

There are eight DNR-designated riding areas in the state. In 2010 three of these areas were signed open to ORV use: Lakeview OHV Park in Johnson County, Tama County OHV Park in Tama County, and the Nicholson-Ford OHV Park in Marshall County. The remaining parks are: Bluff Creek in Mahaska County, Rathbun in Appanoose County, River Valley in Pottawattamie County, Gypsum City in Webster County, and Riverview in Black Hawk County.

The parks are maintained by local clubs through cost-share grants which assist with maintenance, trail development, equipment purchases, fuel for machines, signs for the park, and structures such as shelter houses and vault toilets.

The OHV program is in the process of doing long-term planning for each park to ensure that expansion and construction opportunities are planned using best management practices.

## Snowmobile Program

Volunteer clubs groom and maintain over 5,000 miles of snowmobile trails in Iowa. Clubs receive financial support through cost-share grants which are funded by the registration of machines. Clubs can use the funds for trail development, construction of bridges, fuel for their groomers, and signs for the trails.

Trails in Iowa are a mix of access to private land through agreements with the landowners and ditch trails via agreements with County Boards of Supervisors. The Snowmobile program is in the process of adopting signing guidelines for uniformity of marked trails in the state.

The DNR is responsible for the registration of machines, distribution of registration funds, and for writing the rules and regulations which govern the use of snowmobiles in Iowa under the guidance of the Iowa Legislature.

# Iowa Outdoor EXPO For Kids and Families

Promoting Iowa's natural resources is part of the Law Enforcement Bureau's mission. In 2009, in partnership with the the Des Moines Isaak Walton League, an activity event was held that is sure to become a new Iowa outdoor tradition.

The Ike's Outdoor Expo is held annually in September in conjunction with National Hunting and Fishing Day at Waterworks Park in Des Moines. The Expo is designed for children and families to discover new and exciting ways to enjoy the outdoors.

Families are able to shoot, fish, canoe, and see and touch wildlife while learning about ways to have fun in the great outdoors. A variety of programs are presented on camping, watersports, dutch oven cooking, dog demonstrations, safe handling of snowmobiles and ATVs, crossbows, archery, tree-stand safety, raptors, trapping, map reading, and nature identification.

One goal of the Expo is to give families an introduction to outdoor activities with the hope that this will result in new family traditions that that will provide a legacy for years to come.





### Turn in Poachers

In 2009 a total of 193 Turn in Poachers (TIP) calls and online reports were received. One-hundred-sixty-five of these cases were processed and investigated. In 2009 the TIP Reward Committee approved \$13,500 in payment of rewards on successful cases.

In 2010 a total of 177 TIP calls and online reports were received. Rewards approved for payment in 2010 totaled \$20,150.
