

REAP Conservation Education Program 2014 Grants (FY15)

A total of six conservation education grants were awarded for the May 2014 grant round, with awards totaling \$130,392. Approximately \$206,059 was leveraged through in cash and in-kind contributions through these projects. Another \$31,500 was awarded to the University of Northern Iowa to assist and monitor implementation of CEP grants over a 12-month period. A total of six projects were not funded, totaling \$121,251. Another grant proposal was disqualified because it did not meet REAP CEP requirements.
