### \*6. Contract Amendment-4 with Northwoods Forestry, Inc.

Commission approval is requested for a contract amendment with Northwoods Forestry, Inc., of Eleva, Wisconsin.

#### **Amendment- 4 Terms:**

Amendment Amount: Not to exceed \$90,000 Amendment Dates: 3/17/2020 to 3/17/2021 Funding Source(s): State Forest Nursery Sales

**Amendment Purpose:** To extend manual labor services, as outlined in the original contract, through March 16, 2021. In 2019, Northwoods served when called to assist with lifting and grading to meet shipping deadlines with their usual outstanding speed and accuracy, as well as assisting with weeding during the growing season.

**Original Contract Purpose:** To provide manual labor for weeding (removing weeds from the ground), lifting (removing seedlings from the ground) and grading/packaging (sorting, counting, packaging and sealing bags of bare root seedlings) according to standard operation procedures at DNR's State Forest Nursery (SFN).

Staff from Northwoods Forestry, Inc., travel nationally and specialize in providing labor for nurseries and other labor intensive agricultural services. In 2017, we contracted services with Northwoods Forestry, Inc., in order to achieve a higher yield and receive service that were more cost effective than the previous vendors. In addition to the time factor, the quality of work by Northwoods Forestry has also proven to be exceptional. During quality control checks, the accuracy of the counts and sizes of the seedlings being packaged was found to be higher than that of previous vendors, resulting in fewer complaints by customers.

**Original Selection Process:** In 2017, the DNR published a Request for Proposal (RFP) and reviewed bids for services requested. Northwoods Forestry, Inc., was awarded the bid due to cost, contractor's professional experience, performance record, letters of references, and the capacity of the contractor to complete responsibilities in the timeframe requested.

Commission approval is requested for a timber sale contract with Jones Wood Heating and Logging LLC of McGregor, IA, for French Creek Wildlife Management Area.


Contract Purpose: This contract will facilitate a hardwood timber harvest of an estimated 94,741 board feet in 615 mixed hardwood trees at Indian Bluffs Wildlife Management Area in Jones County. There are an additional 187 cull trees marked for harvest. Cull trees may be harvested, but are not included in the board foot volume of the sale. An even-aged management system will be used in accordance with the French Creek Forest Wildlife Stewardship Plan to allow sunlight to stimulate the growth of seedlings already present on the site. A natural areas inventory was conducted and there are no known threatened and endangered species in the harvest area. Harvesting and regenerating this stand will improve the overall health and vigor of the forest.

Wildlife den trees will be left standing. Iowa Forestry Best Management Practices will apply to the site. No tops or harvesting residue will be left in adjacent waterways. Harvesting is to occur only when ground is firm or frozen to minimize soil disturbance. Skid trails and landing areas will be repaired following the harvest. No skid trails will be allowed in the Stream Management Areas (within 50 feet of the adjacent waterway) except at designated stream crossings.

**Selection Process Summary:** An informal bid process was completed. To be qualified, a timber buyer must have on file with the State of Iowa a bond meeting the requirements of Section 456A.36 of the Code of Iowa and Chapter 571-72 of the Iowa Administrative Code. The forester and supervisor reviewed the bid proposals and the highest bid from the most responsive and responsible bidder was selected.

### 8. Chapter 35 – Fish Habitat Promotion for County Conservation Board Grant Recommendations

The Commission is requested to approve the following grant recommendations pursuant to Chapter 35, Fish Habitat Promotion for County Conservation Board Grants.

**Grant Purpose**: All revenue derived from fish habitat fees, paid for as part of fishing licenses, is deposited in the state fish and game protection fund to be used for fish habitat development. At least fifty percent of all revenue from the sale of fish habitat fees is distributed equally among the six county conservation board districts. Each district is allowed to hold a two-year apportionment before money is redistributed equally among all districts. Applicants must provide at least 10% cost share for their project. This program is managed by the counties and is open to all county conservation boards for habitat development and acquisition purposes. The DNR serves in an advisory role and oversees funding administration.

Funding Source(s): Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund

**Grant Funding Available:** Grants are reviewed by the Counties annually. Funding available for this grant cycle is \$109,719 for each of the six county districts plus any carry over from the previous year for eligible project proposals.

**Summary of Selection Process:** The Fish Habitat Grant Review Committees met in December 2019 and January 2020 to rank and score the county conservation board projects in their district.

**Selection Committee Members:** The review and selection committee for each district consisted of at least five County Conservation Board Directors and one DNR Fisheries Biologist advisor.

### 9. Contract with HDR Engineering, Inc.

Commission approval is requested for a contract with HDR Engineering, Inc., of Omaha, NE.

#### **Contract Terms**

**Amount**: not to exceed \$148,117 **Dates**: 03/17/2020 to 02/21/2021

Funding Source(s): REAP Open Spaces (25%), Federal Sport Fish Restoration Funds (75%)

**Contract Purpose:** The presence of zebra mussels in the source water for Spirit Lake Fish Hatchery poses risks to fish production. During most of the fish production season, there is the potential for zebra mussel veligers to be present in the water that enters the hatchery. This requires all fish and water loaded onto hatchery trucks to be treated before leaving the hatchery to ensure that zebra mussels are not being spread during stocking operations.

In addition to the threat zebra mussels pose to fish production at Spirit Lake Fish Hatchery, a water quality issue has been reducing fish production during the past 5 years. The hatchery has observed an influx of gas supersaturation coming from the lake. This issue has caused an extensive loss of Walleye eggs in the spring. Eggs attach to the bubbles produced by supersaturation, causing them to float out of the incubator system. In the past two years, this issue has caused a loss of over 50% of the Walleye eggs needed for production each year.

In 2018 and 2019, research was conducted at Rathbun Fish Culture Research Facility to test a small scale Recirculating Aquaculture System (RAS). Walleye eggs in this system had an improved hatching rate compared to the traditional incubator system used in the hatchery. Also, with the fish being hatched in clean water that was free of diseases and zebra mussels, they did not need to be treated prior to stocking.

This contract is for the design of a Recirculating Aquaculture System (RAS) that will use an aquatic invasive species-free water source to replace the current incubation system at Spirit Lake Fish Hatchery. The RAS will also address the water quality issues that are reducing fish production and it will ensure that fry are being produced in a zebra mussel free water source. HDR Engineering will create a RAS design, with DNR input and review, that will meet the hatchery's needs. Additional tasks include: prepare bid documents consistent with the final design; assist DNR during the bidding phase in answering technical questions about the plans and specifications, notify potential contractors of the opportunity to maximize the bidder pool, and assist DNR in responding to inquiries received during the bid advertisement phase; and attend a pre-bid meeting for interested contractors. If the design meets hatchery requirements and construction occurs, HDR will provide onsite and telephone design consultation during construction to ensure design plans and specifications are met, provide a maintenance and training manual to DNR that contains complete instruction of how to maintain and operate the RAS, and provide on-site training for DNR staff.

HDR Engineering, Inc. has significant experience designing recirculating aquaculture systems (RAS), including egg incubators. They have designed a RAS egg incubator for the Richmond Hill Hatchery in Georgia, that is a variable rate RAS including temperature manipulation. HDR has also designed entire hatcheries that have recirculating fish culture systems that are much larger in scope and complexity than a RAS egg incubator. These hatcheries include Pffieffer State Fish Hatchery in KY, the Wild Rose State Fish Hatchery in WI, and the Florida Bass Conservation Center in FL. HDR Engineering, Inc, has the expertise to design a RAS egg incubator for the Spirit Lake Fish Hatchery and they have successfully designed and implemented similar or larger projects.

**Selection Process Summary:** The Department solicited bids from targeted small businesses and published a Formal Request for Proposals on the Department of Administrative Services website.

### 10. Contract with Ducks Unlimited, Inc. (Black Hawk Lake)

Commission approval is requested for a contract with Ducks Unlimited, Inc. (DU), of Dexter, Michigan.

#### **Contract Terms:**

**Amount**: Not to exceed \$563,945.00 **Dates**: March 17, 2020 to June 30, 2021

Funding Source(s): Lake Restoration Program (\$225,000.00); Section 319 Grant from the US EPA

(\$200,000.00) and REAP Open Spaces (\$138,945)

**Background:** Black Hawk Lake is the southern-most glacially-formed lake in Iowa. This 922-acre lake has a watershed of 14,097 acres and is home to Black Hawk State Park and the City of Lake View. Water quality problems have been documented as early as the 1930s. Restoration at Black Hawk Lake began in 2012 to improve water clarity in the lake, provide a better sport fishery for anglers, and to improve water quality in the lake by reducing nutrient and sediment inputs to the lake.

In 2012, the DNR renovated the fishery and several sections along the lake were armored to protect the lake from shoreline erosion. Renovating the fishery to remove carp and other rough fish was a key component to improving water clarity in the lake. A watershed project also began in 2012, and to date, over 211 practices have been installed in the watershed to reduce sediment and nutrient inputs to the lake.

In 2015, a small scale dredging project was completed at the State Marina to remove 3 feet of soft sediment from the lake bottom, which allowed for better boat access to a cove of the lake that was especially shallow. Work also began in 2015 to dredge the inlet (Provost Bay), which was identified in the Diagnostic and Feasibility Study as being critical to achieving long term water quality improvement. Between 2017 and 2019, approximately 330,000 CY of sediment were removed from the Bay and the wetland was re-meandered, allowing for additional sediment and nutrient storage.


While a few carp have returned to the lake, managing carp and other rough fish populations is key to maintaining better water quality in the lake long term. To do this, it is essential to minimize pathways where fish can move in and out of the lake. Cutting off fish access to Provost Bay is the most critical pathway to block, as carp tend to migrate into the bay to spawn. By putting an effective fish barrier in place between the bay and the lake, managers can minimize population growth of rough fish by removing access to their breeding waters.

In February 2019, the Department entered into an agreement with DU for feasibility assessments, professional bio-engineering services, bid letting, and construction management services for shallow lakes and large marshes. DU designed the engineering plans for Black Hawk Lake's fish barrier and water pump system, prepared and bid the project, and will manage this construction with DNR oversight.

**Contract Purpose:** This contract will install a high capacity water control pump, remove the current barrier, and construct a new fish barrier between Black Hawk Lake and Provost Bay. The barrier and pump system

will minimize the movement of undesirable fish species between the lake and their spawning habitat in the marsh and allow for better water control management of Provost Bay to promote the growth of wetland vegetation. The new barrier will consist of concrete structures similar to box culverts with metal screens that will raise and rotate for safe debris removal from the screens.





**Previously Completed Work at Black Hawk Lake:** Extensive restoration work has taken place, both in the watershed and within the lake. Since work began in 2012, water clarity has improved, the frequency and intensity of harmful algal blooms has decreased, and vegetation has begun to grow around the perimeter of the lake – reducing wind and wave re-suspension of sediment and nutrients. Additionally, the sport fishery is thriving following the renovation of the fishery.

Watershed work completed through the Federal Section 319 program include streambank stabilization, CRP, bioswales, rain gardens, wetlands, cover crops, and conservation tillage practices (\$612,900 since 2014). In-lake work completed to date includes:

**Anticipated Future Work:** Future work will include the continuation of watershed BMPs through the Black Hawk Lake Watershed Project. A potential dredging project for the main body of the lake is also being developed that would target the removal of between 750,000 and 1,000,000 CY of excess sediment from the main body of the lake, where sediment and nutrient re-suspension can impact internal loading within the lake (estimated budget \$5-\$6 million).

Amendment Purpose: Continue printing and mailing services and list management for engineering projects.

**Original Contract Purpose:** In March 2017, the Department entered into an agreement with Des Moines Blue Print Company/Beeline and Blue for printing and distribution services for projects advertised by the DNR Engineering Bureau. Iowa Code Chapter 26.3 competitive bids for public improvement contracts requires the DNR to advertise for sealed bids for proposed public improvement projects by posting a notice to bidders not less than thirteen and not more than forty-five days before the date for filing bids in a relevant contractor plan room service with statewide circulation. Purpose and Summary

Chapter 98 regulates spring wild turkey hunting for both residents and nonresidents, and includes season dates, bag limits, possession limits, shooting hours, areas open to hunting, licensing procedures, means and methods of take, and transportation tag requirements.

One change is proposed to Chapter 98. The starting date of the Archery-only season is being aligned with the starting date of the Combination shotgun-or-archery season.

Chapter 99 regulates fall wild turkey hunting for residents, and includes season dates, bag limits, possession limits, shooting hours, areas open to hunting, licensing procedures, means and methods of take, and transportation tag requirements. (Note: there is no fall wild turkey season for nonresidents in lowa, except for nonresidents who are under 21 years old and have a severe physical disability or have been diagnosed with a terminal illness. See lowa Code § 483A.24(12) and 571--99.2(4)).

One change is proposed to Chapter 99. The Combination shotgun-or-archery quota for Zone 8 is being raised from 150 to 200.

### Fiscal Impact

This rule making has no fiscal impact to the state of Iowa. The proposed amendment to Chapter 98 simply aligns season dates which will not impact license sales or hunter purchasing. The proposed amendment to Chapter 99 will make 50 more licenses available in Zone 8. However, fall turkey hunting license sales have been declining in other parts of the state. It is anticipated the overall declines will overcome any gains made by the small increase in Zone 8.

This rule making proposes three amendments to Chapter 106. First, general deer licenses are reestablished as valid in seven counties (Cerro Gordo, Franklin, Grundy, Hardin, Hancock, Winnebago and Worth) for all seasons,

and all of northwest Iowa for the early muzzleloader season. Deer populations have been steadily increasing in the northwest allowing for this increase in recreational opportunity for Iowa hunters.

Second, the January antlerless-deer-only season is rescinded for all counties. Due to a widespread outbreak of Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) in the summer of 2019, deer numbers and harvest were down across these areas of the state.

Importantly, no license fee changes are proposed in this rule making.

The Department does anticipate a possibly minor increase in license sales from this proposed rule making due to 125 more tags being available statewide. However, hunters will choose not to purchase tags in areas of low deer density so artificially maintaining high deer quotas will not change that fact. Any revenue resulting from this proposed rule making shall be deposited into the State Fish and Game Protection Fund. ### 17. Chapter 108, "Mink, Muskrat, Raccoon, Badger, Opossum, Weasel, Striped Skunk, Fox (Red and Gray), Beaver, Coyote, River Otter, Bobcat, Gray (Timber) Wolf and Spotted Skunk Seasons"- Notice of Intended Action

The Commission is requested to approve the Notice of Intended Action – Chapter 108, "Mink, Muskrat, Raccoon, Badger, Opossum, Weasel, Striped Skunk, Fox (Red and Gray), Beaver, Coyote, River Otter, Bobcat, Gray (Timber) Wolf and Spotted Skunk Seasons."

**Basic Intent of Rule -** This chapter contains the regulations for the furharvest season and includes season dates, bag limits, possession limits, trapping and hunting hours, and areas open to trapping and hunting.

### **Proposed Rule Change -** This rule proposes to:

- 1. Increase the bag limit for river otters from two per furharvester to three per furharvester,
- 2. Add Boone and Webster counties to the one bobcat per furharvester zone, and
- 3. Clarify the total allowable bobcat harvest by a furharvester in a season.

Population data from the past 12 years reveals that lowa's river otter and bobcat populations continue to grow and expand into more counties with suitable habitat. This data is compiled from a variety of sources, such as hunter surveys, harvest information, field reports, and sightings. This proposed rule change is biologically responsible, as required by law, and will also increase recreational opportunities for lowa furharvesters while helping minimize social issues associated with high river otter and bobcat densities.

### **Notice of Intended Action**

The Natural Resource Commission hereby proposes to amend Chapter 108, "Mink, Muskrat, Raccoon, Badge, Opossum, Weasel, Striped Skunk, Fox (Red and Gray), Beaver, Coyote, River Otter, Bobcat, Gray (Timber) Wolf and Spotted Skunk Seasons", Iowa Administrative Code.

Legal Authority for Rule Making

This rule making is proposed under the authority provided in 455A.5(6)"a", 481A.38, 481A.39, and 481A.87. State or Federal Law Implemented

This rule making implements, in whole or in part, Iowa Code section 481A.87.

Purpose and Summary

Chapter 108 sets the season dates, bag limits, possession limits and areas open to hunting or trapping furbearers. This rule making proposes to: 1) increase the bag limit for river otters from two per furharvester to three per furharvester, 2) add Boone and Webster counties to the one bobcat per furharvester zone, and 3) to clarify the total allowable bobcat harvest by a furharvester in a season. Population data from the past 12 years reveals that lowa's river otter and bobcat populations continue to grow and expand into more counties with suitable habitat. These data are compiled from a variety of sources, such as hunter surveys, harvest information, field reports, and sightings. This proposed rule change is biologically responsible, as required by law, and will also increase recreational opportunities for lowa furharvesters while helping minimize social issues associated with high river otter and bobcat densities.

Fiscal Impact

This rule making has no fiscal impact to the state of Iowa.

### Jobs Impact

After analysis and review of this rule making, no impact on jobs has been found.

### Waivers

Any person who believes that the application of the discretionary provisions of this rule making would result in hardship or injustice to that person may petition the Natural Resource Commission for a waiver of the discretionary provisions, if any, pursuant to 571 lowa Administrative Code chapter 11.

### Review by Administrative Rules Review Committee

The Administrative Rules Review Committee, a bipartisan legislative committee which oversees rule making by executive branch agencies, may, on its own motion or on written request by any individual or group, review this rule making at its regular monthly meeting or at a special meeting. The Committee's meetings are open to the public, and interested persons may be heard as provided in Iowa Code section 17A.8(6).

The following rule-making action proposed:

ITEM 1. Amend subrule 108.7(3) as follows:

108.7(3) Seasonal bag limit. The seasonal bag limit for river otters is  $2 \cdot 3$  river otters per person. The seasonal bag limit for bobcats is 1 bobcat per person in the following counties: Audubon, Boone, Cedar, Cherokee, Clinton, Crawford, Dallas, Guthrie, Harrison, Iowa, Jackson, Jasper, Johnson, Lyon, Monona, Muscatine, Plymouth, Polk, Poweshiek, Scott, Shelby, Sioux, Webster, and Woodbury. The seasonal bag limit for bobcats is 3 bobcats per person in the following counties: Adair, Adams, Appanoose, Cass, Clarke, Davis, Decatur, Des Moines, Fremont, Henry, Jefferson, Keokuk, Lee, Louisa, Lucas, Madison, Mahaska, Marion, Mills, Monroe, Montgomery, Page, Pottawattamie, Ringgold, Taylor, Union, Van Buren, Wapello, Warren, Washington, and Wayne. No more than 3 bobcats total can be legally harvested by a furharvester in a season. River otters or bobcats trapped in excess of the seasonal bag limit or in a closed area must be turned over to the department; the trapper shall not be penalized.
