


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

Sand Creek Woodland Savanna is the 15th bird conservation area (BCA) to be dedicated in Iowa.

Located in Decatur, Ringgold and Union counties, the BCA encompasses more than 30,000 acres. In contrast with the nearby Kellerton BCA which is mostly grassland, nearly 1/3 of the Sand Creek BCA is woodland. Northern Bobwhite, Great Crested Flycatcher, Black-and-white Warbler, Red-headed Woodpecker, Wood Thrush, Northern Mockingbird, Yellow-billed Cuckoo and Lark Sparrow all nest within the BCA.




BIRD CONSERVATION AREAS

Within the last two decades, alarming declines in a large number of species of North American birds have led to the emergence of national and international programs



dedicated to the conservation of game and non-game birds. Since 1999, bird conservation organizations and enthusiasts have worked together under an umbrella

IMPORTANT BIRD AREAS

The Important Bird Areas (IBA) Program is a global effort initiated by the National Audubon Society to identify and conserve areas that are vital to birds and other biodiversity. Designated IBAs include sites for breeding, wintering, and/or migrating birds. By working to identify and implement conservation strategies, the IBA Program hopes to minimize the effects of habitat degradation and loss on birds and other wildlife. All Iowa BCAs are also considered IBAs.

SAND CREEK DIVERSITY



Oak Savanna once covered much of southern Iowa. This unique ecosystem is characterized by a widely spaced hardwood canopy and an understory that includes native grasses and tallgrass prairie forbs. Historically, these open woodlands were maintained by regular fires and grazing. Today, much of the savanna landscape has been

converted to row crops, and large tracts of what remains have become dense woodlands in the absence of fire, allowing the canopy to close and the grassland plants to die out. The Sand Creek BCA includes woodland, grassland, and savanna species.

PLANTS

Oak, walnut, and hickory make up most of the woodland and savanna canopy within the BCA. The diverse understory is dominated by grasses, sedges and forbs. Iconic prairie species such as Big and Little Bluestem, Purple Milkweed, Bottle Brush Grass, Pennsylvania Sedge, and Virginia Wild Rye can be found blanketing the gently rolling hills. During the spring and summer



months. delicate wildflowers like wood sorrel. mountain mint, and prairie violet.

ANIMALS

In addition to birds, you can find many other interesting animals in the Sand

Creek BCA, many of which rely at least in part on intact savanna ecosystems. Bobcats, Coyotes, Red and Gray Fox, various weasels and Mink roam the area. You can also find Smooth Green Snakes, both softshell turtle

species, Iowa's critically imperiled Slaty Skimmer dragonfly, and the rare Hayhurst's Scallopwing butterfly.
