DIRECTOR'S REMARKS

- Director Lyon reported that she presented to the House Ag and Natural Resources Committee. During her presentation she highlighted the work being done at Lake Ahquabi State Park, hunting and fishing license sales data, DNR educational programming, State Forestry Nursery data, and some of the success we have seen in recent water quality improvement projects.
- Director Lyon also gave a recap of the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) state tournament that was held the first weekend in March. She reported that there were around 2200 students that participated from 125 different schools in both the Bullseye and 3D Shoot categories. Director Lyon extended her gratitude to all the staff and volunteers that made the event possible and congratulated students on their success at the tournament.

Terms

Amount: No Cost Dates: April 14, 2023 to April 13, 2038

Purpose: Honey Creek Resort State Park (Honey Creek) is Iowa's premier destination resort located within the Rathbun Lake recreation complex. Rathbun Lake was built by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to address the Chariton River Valley's susceptibility to cycles of drought and flood. This popular recreation complex includes the 11,000-acre lake, Iowa's largest; and eight public parks, 155 miles of shoreline, two marinas, and 21,000 acres of public land. Honey Creek was placed in south-central Iowa because Rathbun Lake's picturesque setting and diverse recreational opportunities provides an ideal gateway into Iowa's state park system. Honey Creek was completed in October 2008 and is the only full-service resort property on the lake. The current concession operator gave notice of its intent to vacate the property this spring. DAS and DNR mutually agreed that DAS would take over responsibility for Honey Creek, and this 28E formally captures that arrangement.

In detail: The DNR's purpose in entering into this 28E is to delegate its authority in operating Honey Creek to DAS. DAS's purpose in entering into this 28E is to operate Honey Creek through a concessionaire contract obtained through a competitive procurement process (Achieva Enterprises LLC).

The Commission is requested to adopt a Final rule to amend Chapter 12, "Conservation Education," Chapter 15, "General License Regulations," and Chapter 94, "Nonresident Deer Hunting."

Basic Intent of Current Rule: This rule updates the listed chapters to comply with recent legislation.

NOIA Process: The Notice of Intended Action was approved by the NRC on December 12, 2023.

2022 Iowa Acts, House File 803, allowed physician assistants to perform various duties that are within their undisputed scope of practice. The legislation specifically directed agencies to add physician assistants to rules that are currently limited to physicians. Chapters 12, 15, and 94 each contain provisions that reference physicians. This proposed rule making amends these chapters as required by the legislation.

The rule includes other medical professionals, too; specifically, doctors of osteopathy and nurse practitioners. Authorizing a suite of medical professionals to complete certain tasks enables a volunteer instructor and/or hunter to utilize the volunteer instructor's or hunter's preferred care provider.

The Notice of Intended Action was published in the Iowa Administrative Bulletin on January 11, 2023, as ARC 6816C. No public comments were received.

NATURAL RESOURCE COMMISSION[571] Adopted and Filed

The Natural Resource Commission (Commission) hereby adopts Chapter 12, "Conservation Education," Chapter 15, "General License Regulations," and Chapter 94, "Nonresident Deer Hunting," Iowa Administrative Code.

Legal Authority for Rule Making

This rule making is adopted under the authority provided in Iowa Code section 147.77 as amended by 2022 Iowa Acts, House File 803, and sections 321G.2, 321I.2, 462A.3(2) and 483A.27(8).

State or Federal Law Implemented

This rule making implements, in whole or in part, Iowa Code section 147.77 as amended by 2022 Iowa Acts, House File 803, and sections 321G.23, 321I.25, 462A.12(6), 462A.12A, 483A.8(8), 483A.24(12) and 483A.27(4).

Purpose and Summary

2022 Iowa Acts, House File 803, allowed physician assistants to perform various duties that are within their undisputed scope of practice. The legislation specifically directed agencies to add physician assistants to rules that are currently limited to physicians. Chapters 12, 15, and 94 each contain provisions that reference physicians. This proposed rule making amends these chapters as required by the legislation.

The Commission also amends the rules to include other medical professionals: specifically, doctors of osteopathy and nurse practitioners. Authorizing a suite of medical professionals to complete certain tasks enables a volunteer instructor and/or hunter to utilize the volunteer instructor's or hunter's preferred care provider.

Public Comment and Changes to Rule Making

Notice of Intended Action for this rule making was published in the Iowa Administrative Bulletin on January 11, 2023, as **ARC** 6816C.

The modifiers "attending" and "prescribing" were removed from the Final version. Those terms were unnecessary and could create confusion.

Adoption of Rule Making

This rule making was adopted by the Commission on April 13, 2023.

The following rule-making action is adopted:

ITEM 1. Amend rule 571—12.25(321G,321I,462A,483A) as follows:

571—12.25(321G,321I,462A,483A) Grounds for revocation or suspension of instructor certification. The department may, at any time, seek to revoke or suspend the instructor certification of any person who:

1. to 7. No change.

8. Participates in a course while under the influence of alcohol or any illegal drug or while ingesting prescription medication in a manner contrary to the dosing directions given by the prescribing physician. The physician shall be a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, physician assistant, or advanced registered nurse practitioner.

9. to 13. No change.

ITEM 2. Amend subrules 15.22(2) and 15.22(4) as follows:

15.22(2) Application for authorization card. An individual requesting use of a crossbow for hunting deer or turkey must submit an application for an authorization card on forms provided by

the department. The application must include a statement signed by the applicant's physician declaring that the individual is not physically capable of shooting a bow and arrow. <u>The physician shall be a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, physician assistant, or advanced registered nurse practitioner.</u> A first-time applicant must submit the authorization card application no later than ten days before the last day of the license application period for the season the person intends to hunt.

15.22(4) Validity and forfeiture of authorization card. A card authorizing the use of a crossbow for hunting deer and turkey will be valid for as long as the person is incapable of shooting a bow and arrow. If a conservation officer has probable cause to believe the person's handicapped status has improved, making it possible for the person to shoot a bow and arrow, the department may, upon the officer's request, require the person to obtain in writing a current physician's statement. The physician shall be a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, physician assistant, or advanced registered nurse practitioner.

If the person is unable to obtain a current physician's statement confirming that the person is incapable of shooting a bow and arrow, the department may initiate action to revoke the authorization card pursuant to 571—Chapter 7.

ITEM 3. Amend subrule 94.10(1) as follows:

94.10(1) *Licenses.* A nonresident meeting the requirements of Iowa Code section 321L.1(8) may apply for or purchase a nonresident deer hunting license to participate in a special deer hunting season for severely disabled persons. Nonresidents applying for this license must have on file with the department of natural resources either a copy of a disabilities parking permit issued by a state department of transportation or an Iowa DNR form signed by a physician that verifies their disability. The physician shall be a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, physician assistant, or advanced registered nurse practitioner.

Decision Item

8. Chapter 108, "Mink, Muskrat, Raccoon, Badger, Opossum, Weasel, Striped Skunk, Fox (Red and Gray), Beaver, Coyote, River Otter, Bobcat, Gray (Timber) Wolf and Spotted Skunk Seasons" – Final Rule

The Commission is requested to adopt a Final rule to amend Chapter 108, "Mink, Muskrat, Raccoon, Badger, Opossum, Weasel, Striped Skunk, Fox (Red and Gray), Beaver, Coyote, River Otter, Bobcat, Gray (Timber) Wolf and Spotted Skunk Seasons".

Basic Intent of Current Rule: Chapter 108 sets the season dates, bag limits, possession limits, and areas open to hunting or trapping furbearers.

NOIA Process: The Notice of Intended Action was approved by the NRC on December 8, 2022. This rule making extends the regular furharvest season by one month. The season will end on the last day of February (February 28), rather than the last day of January (January 31). This rule making also adopts a continuous open season statewide for raccoon hunting and trapping. This rule is biologically responsible, as required by law. It will also increase recreational opportunities for Iowa fur harvesters while reducing negative social issues associated with high raccoon and other furbearer densities.

The Notice of Intended Action for this rule making was published in the Iowa Administrative Bulletin on January 11, 2023, as ARC 6815C. An Amended Notice of Intended Action was published in the Iowa Administrative Bulletin on March 8, 2023, as ARC 6948C.

Public hearings were held on February 2, 2023, at 12 noon at Conference Room 4E Wallace State office building and on March 28, 2023, at 12 noon via a virtual meeting. Two people attended the in-person meeting and no one attended the virtual meeting.

117 total comments were received. 75 comments were in support of the amendments, 2 were partially supportive, and 40 opposed the amendments. The majority of commenters supporting the amendments believed a change should be made to limit the continuous hunting and trapping of raccoons to private lands. These commenters believe there is a potential for negative interactions on public lands and roadways during non-traditional hunting or trapping seasons.

Changes from NOIA: Changes to the NOIA limit the continuous open season for hunting and trapping raccoons to private lands. A majority of the rule proponents made this request and the department agrees with the logic behind it. This change will not impact the biological effect of the rule on Iowa's raccoon population and does not significantly affect the intent of the amendment.

This rule making also adopts a continuous open season statewide for raccoon hunting and trapping. This rule is biologically responsible, as required by law. 117 total comments were received. 75 comments were in support of the amendments, 2 were partially supportive, and 40 opposed the amendments. The majority of commenters supporting the amendments believed a change should be made to limit the continuous hunting and trapping of raccoons to private lands. These commenters expressed concern for negative interactions on public lands and roadways during non-traditional hunting or trapping seasons.

Open season for the taking of raccoon, badger, opossum, and striped skunk shall be from 8 a.m. on the first Saturday in November through January 31 February 28 of succeeding year. Entire state open. No bag or possession limit.

ITEM 3. Renumber rules 571—108.3(481A) to 571—108.9(481A) as 571—108.4(481A) to 571—108.10(481A).

ITEM 4. Adopt the following <u>new</u> rule 571—108.3(481A):

571-108.3(481A) Raccoon.

108.3(1) *Hunting.* Continuous open season <u>on private lands and from 8 a.m. on the first Saturday in November through</u> <u>February 28 of the succeeding year on public lands</u>. Entire state open. No bag or possession limit.

108.3(2) *Trapping.* Continuous open season using cage traps and dog-proof traps <u>on private lands</u> year-round. Trapping limitations described in 571—Chapter 110 apply to trapping raccoons from 8 a.m. on the first Saturday in November through February 28 of succeeding year <u>on all lands</u>. Entire state open. No bag or possession limit.

ITEM 5. Amend renumbered rule 571—108.4(481A) as follows:

571—108.4(481A) Red and gray fox. Open season for the taking of red and gray fox shall be from 8 a.m. on the first Saturday in November through January 31 February 28 of succeeding year. Entire state open. No bag or possession limit.

12.1 Chapter 18 Lease Renewal – Allamakee County – Interstate Power and Lights Company

The Natural Resource Commission is requested to approve the renewal of Chapter 18 lease 10-R with Interstate Power and Lights Company.

Location: A portion of the bed of the Mississippi River approximately 600 feet of frontage by 400 feet of depth located in Sections 2&3, Township 98 North, Range 3 East of the 5th P.M. at Mississippi River Mile 660 in Allamakee County, Iowa.

14. Construction-Large Projects

14.1 Green Valley State Park – Union County

The Department requests Commission approval of the following construction project:

Project Summary: Green Valley State Park is located north of Creston, and was dedicated in 1953. Amenities includes a campground, three camping cabins, two picnic shelters, a beach, four boat ramps, and hiking trails.

The DNR owns and operates the Green Valley Lake dam facility with a water surface area of approximately 390 acres. The spillway structure consists of a primary service facility made up of a 135-foot long "L" shaped weir that spills into a 30-foot wide spillway chute. The spillway was constructed in the 1950's.

A visual inspection of the spillway structure in August 2021 showed that number of areas of the concrete slab, especially at joints, has deteriorated and have shifted creating opening for the water to enter and go under the slab. There is flaking and cracking along many portions of the surface exposing portions of the reinforcing bars. Additionally, 30 ft portion of the west wall near the end of the chute has collapsed and needs to be rebuilt. The lake will be lowered approximately 1 foot below crest to keep the spillway dry during construction.

14.2 Iowa River Wildlife Unit, Swan Lake Road Culvert Replacement – Johnson County The Department requests Commission approval of the following construction project:

Project Summary: The Hawkeye Wildlife Management Area is located northwest of North Liberty, and consists of 13,708 acres of timber, upland, and marsh habitat. project site is located approximately 4 miles west of I-380 on Swan Lake Road, NW of North Liberty. The 13,705-acre area is made up of timber, upland and marsh and is hunting ground for deer, squirrel, pheasant, waterfowl and dove. Popular game species in this area include deer, squirrel, pheasant, waterfowl, and dove.

The existing bridge is estimated to have been constructed in the 1970's or 1980's, and is in need of replacement. This agreement will increase the number of foresters on the ground with the technical skills to provide much-needed assistance to private landowners in existing contracts, as well as those interested in enrolling in conservation programs.

Under this contract, WMI will continue to hire and employ up to 6 Forestry Specialists from May 1, 2023 through June 30, 2028. Private Lands Forestry Specialists will provide direct, no- cost technical assistance to private landowners. They will work with landowners to apply for tree planting cost-share assistance at local USDA offices to reduce the cost to the landowner for tree planting, forest stand improvement, and wildlife habitat improvements. Landowners can receive stewardship plans for their existing woodlands to help them keep these woodlands healthy and productive. Private landowners will also be provided information on conservation and biological need for forest management, as well as information about how to implement management practices that will help them meet their goals for their property. WMI will continue to manage staffing and provide oversight. The DNR will continue to provide the structure of a Private Lands Program within which these specialists will work as well as coordinate collaboration with DNR field staff. The agreement can also provide forestry specialists to work on related projects such as public lands forestry work or implementation of U.S. Forest Service grants, as needed.

Since 2018, this agreement has employed twelve bright individuals committed to forestry and natural resources. It has helped the department train early career professionals and identify potential talent. Every individual who has held one of these positions is either still in their position, pursuing an advanced degree, or was hired by a natural resource agency (including DNR) into a permanent, professional position.
