

2017 REAP Assembly Report

During the October 2017, 18 Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) Assemblies were conducted throughout lowa. The REAP Assemblies are required, per Iowa Code Chapter 455A.17, to be conducted on odd numbered years to provide attendees with information about REAP expenditures, ask attendees to identify opportunities or changes in policy, programs or funding, vote on motions for the five elected delegates per region to vote on at REAP Congress. 555 Iowans participated in the 2017 REAP Assemblies. In addition to electing delegates, the participants made 63 motions that will be forwarded to the REAP Congress for consideration on January 6, 2018.

The following motions were approved at the Assemblies. The number behind the motion indicates the number of Assemblies at which it was approved.


