



MINES OF SPAIN STATE RECREATION AREA

Welcome to the Mines of Spain State Recreation Area, the crown jewel of Dubuque County, and where it all began in Iowa. The Mines of Spain is your stop for learning about the cultural history and the natural resources of eastern Iowa. Whether you are here to bird watch or hike the trails, we hope you will enjoy your stay at the 1439 acre Mines of Spain

PARK AMENITIES/POINTS OF INTEREST/THINGS TO DO

Julien Dubuque, credited as the first European to settle in Iowa (1788), received a land grant from the Governor of Spain in 1796. The grant gave Dubuque permission to work the 189-square mile area owned by Spain and named the "Mines of Spain." Lead mining was a major part of this area's history, first by Native Americans, and later (late 1830s through the 1850s) by European miners and farmers. The Civil War renewed lead mining activity for a while, but it eventually ended in 1914.

Today, Mines of Spain State Recreation Area consists of 1,439 acres of forests and prairies along 3 miles of Mississippi River shoreline. Points of interest include the Julien Dubuque Monument constructed in 1897 and the Horseshoe Bluff Interpretive Area consisting of rock cliffs, a wetland and prairies. The E. B. Lyons Interpretive Center serves as your visitor center with exhibits and displays about the history and nature of the area. The center is a scenic byway center on the Great River Road. The America's State Tree Woodland Walk has trees planted representing the 50 states. Join our interpreters for nature and history-related programs and hikes all year long.

The area has 16.5 miles of trails designated as "National Recreational Trails; that extend throughout the park. There are 14 individual trails interconnected to create one long trail. The trails take you through a variety of habitats, from wetland areas in the Horseshoe Bluff area to forests and tallgrass prairies throughout. A keen observer will likely see some of the wildlife species that reside in these various habitats. The trails are a combination of grass, crushed rock and stairs. During the winter months, 3.5 miles of the trails are groomed for cross-country skiing. Grooming is done for inline and skate skiing.

The area has limited facilities. Rest rooms are located at the E. B. Lyons Interpretive Center and the Horseshoe Bluff area. Bring drinking water along on your hike. Drinking water is only available at the interpretive center.

The Mines of Spain is designated as the Julien Dubuque's National Historic Landmark, Silos and Smokestacks National Heritage Area Partner Site, Watchable Wildlife Area, Important Birding Area, a National Wildlife Federation Area, and Catfish Creek State Preserve.

SPECIAL PARK RULES

Limited deer hunting is allowed in portions of the recreation area. Ask for a map and rules at the Interpretive Center. Trails are for hiking and cross-country skiing only. Horses and bicycles can use the park road only. Metal detector use is not allowed in the park due to the historic designations. Pick up the rules/regulations booklet for more information on general park rules. Rock climbing and rappelling are not permitted.

LOCAL EVENTS/ATTRACTIONS

Crystal Lake Cave and Czipers Apple Orchard are within 2 miles, south on Hwy 52. One mile north is the city of Dubuque, with the Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium and Port of Dubuque, Fenelon Place Elevator, Dubuque Arboretum, Dubuque River Rides and Lock & Dam #11. Sundown Ski Resort is west of the Dubuque. For more information go to www.traveldubuque.com

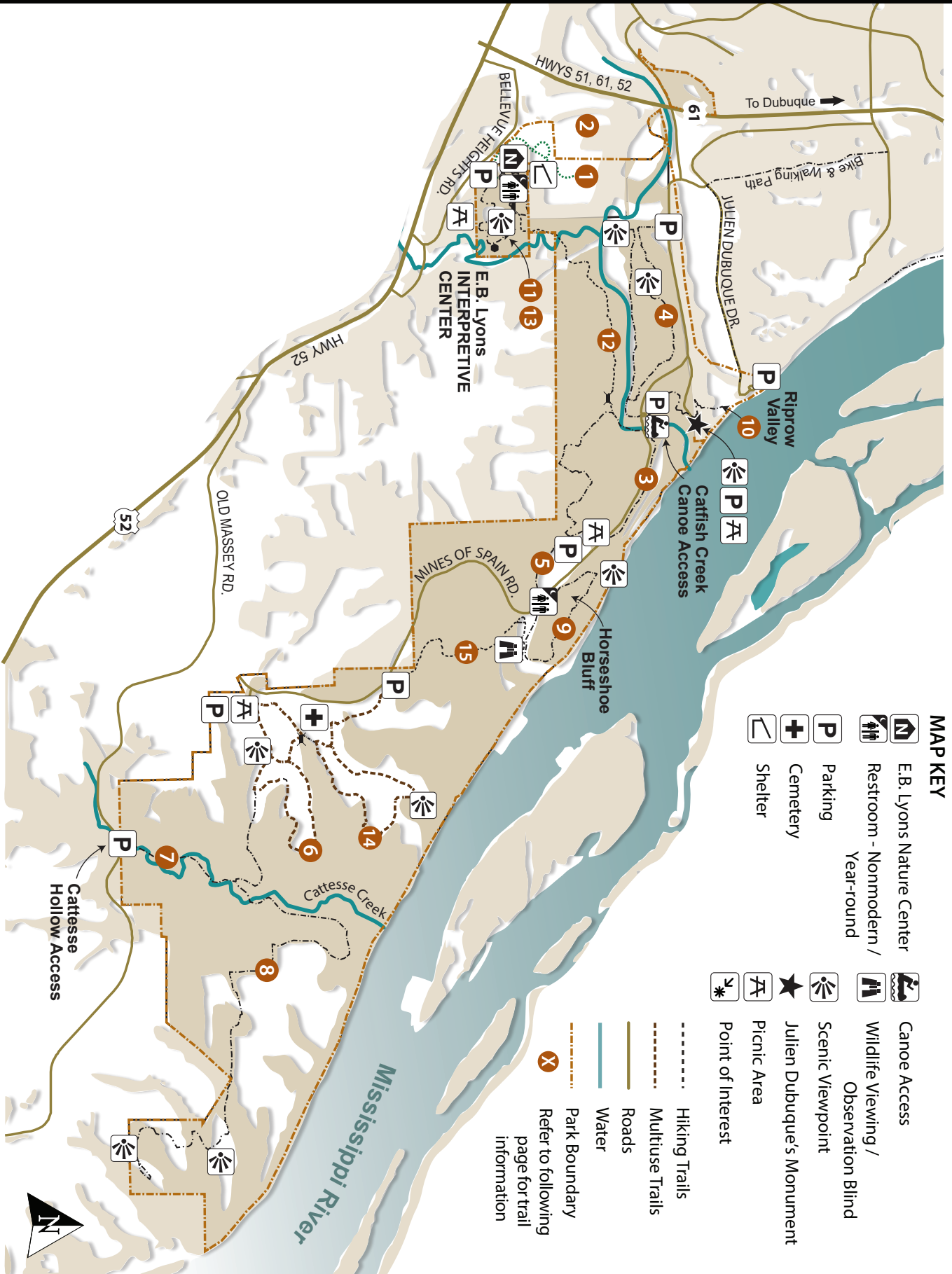
